

Metropolitan Money Market Fund Risk profile-Conservative

INVESTMENT STRATEGY

The investment fund is a low risk, domestic only, fixed income portfolio which aims to outperform the Short Term Fixed Interest (STeFI) Index before fees over year rolling periods. This portfolio is suited to investors with a low risk profile seeking a competitive yield without compromising on liquidity or capital invested.

QUARTERLY COMMENT

Gold prices have been on a steady rise, as global political crises lifted demand for the asset. Inflation outlooks in major economies have been clouded by the tariff uncertainty. We have observed that markets have absorbed and moved past the initial shock from the tariffs. SA's sovereign credit spread has remained resilient despite headwinds from global risk aversion and domestic fiscal uncertainty and continued to trade above the implied sovereign rating.

Striking a balance between the upside risks to inflation and the downside risks to the labour market has remained a key challenge for the Fed's monetary policy decisions. This suggests that the FOMC may lean toward cutting rates to mitigate potential risks to the labour market. The Fed delivered a 25bps "risk management" cut at the meeting held in September, aimed at cushioning the labour market against downside risks.

The modest uptick in September's inflation number is unlikely to concern the ECB much, as projections indicate it will decline again and fall below the Bank's target by 2026. The eurozone is expected to see a firmer recovery in 2026, supported by the cumulative 200bps of eight rate cuts since 2024, fiscal expansion and increased defence spending in Germany. The ECB is expected to adopt cautious approach to its monetary easing cycle and is unlikely to implement further cut rates in 2025.

The BOE maintained its policy rate at 4%, as widely anticipated by markets, citing soft labour market data and persistent inflation pressures that remain above the bank's target and are expected to edge higher. Markets do not expect any further rate cuts before year-end. However, Deputy Governor Dave Ramsden indicated that the Bank could continue easing its key interest rate while still guiding inflation toward the 2% target.

Domestically, the MPC kept interest rates unchanged at 7% during its September meeting, pausing to assess the effects of the cumulative 125bps in rate cuts implemented since September 2024. The SARB's adoption of a 3% inflation anchor marks a significant macroeconomic policy shift aimed at lowering inflation expectations. The upcoming Medium-Term Budget Policy Statement in November will be closely monitored for any announcement from the Minister of Finance regarding a potential formal adjustment to the current inflation target band. We anticipate a gradual policy easing cycle from 2026 onwards, supported by contained inflation and the government's formal endorsement of a lower inflation target.

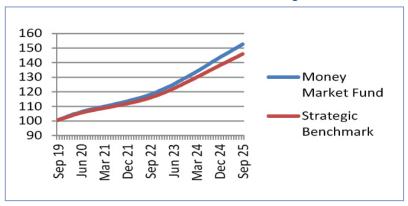
PORTFOLIO MANDATE

A focus on diversification of credit risk, high liquidity and management of interest risk makes this fund an attractive alternative to traditional call accounts and fixed deposits.
